In The Meantime 2007 continues to unfold. This year has proven to be one of the most eventful and fruitful years in our history. Operating within our seventh year as In The Meantime, we have developed new programs, and hired and developed seven new brothers to facilitate this scope of work.

We have expanded our Board of Directors that now even more accurately reflects the diversity and brilliance that is a fact of our community.

We have hosted a myriad of community cultural events that were designed to educate, celebrate and affirm our people.

Our advocacy on both the state and county levels has made us heroes to some and yet despised by those divisive, ego-driven individuals in places of relative power. Our voice was heard by the State Office of AIDS and yet we continue to be challenged by those who would see Black people die and clumped into categories that minimize our existence. Our recommendations for Black gay men have been met to some degree by the Los Angeles Department of Public Health Office of AIDS Programs and Policy. We have spent countless hours in conferences and meetings to help develop the new HIV/AID prevention plan for 2008.

We have strengthened our current programming that includes the NIA Project, The MY LIFE MY STYLE project, The POWER Project and the GAAME Plan. It is our plan to further develop these existing programs and to diversify our funding sources. We have exceeded all of our programmatic goals for all of our programs and continue to challenge ourselves on how we might

better impact Black gay men of all ages.

Both the Wellness for Life Black Men's Health Conference and the Umoja Retreat were clearly defined and have taken on lives of their own. We have a new location for our Wellness conference and both Kwanzaa and King Day have become even more impactful and inclusive as we continue to share our rich history and culture with the larger Los Angeles community.

We are here because we are supposed to be here. We continue to do the work that is required because we are suppose to facilitate this work. We continue to stand up to the perceived adversities that ego-driven individuals continue to present because it makes us stronger.

We enter into 2008 with the theme VICTORIOUS. It is our truth, based on a PURE intention to facilitate good work. We KNOW that our community is better because of In The Meantime, and that others who have seen through us what is possible will also emerge and will join us in VICTORY.

"Wake up everybody no more sleepin in bed. No more backward thinkin time for thinkin ahead. The world has changed so very much from what it used to be so there is so much hatred war an' poverty. Wake up all the teachers time to teach a new way. Maybe then they'll listen to whatcha have to say. Greg Wilson


HOT CHOCOLATE SJNGLES Greg Wilson is a 26-year-old African American man who has been very instrumental in the Black gay community through

What do you look for in a potential date?






